II Jesus Victorious

Two Days after Jesus' terrible death –
a death given vivid visual depiction in Mel Gibson's film **Passion of the
Christ** –

No Jesus.
What was going on? What was happening?

Do you think the apostles were surprised? Shocked?
This Jesus who had died a most brutal death *is now alive*,
